## The DSO presents Beethoven Festival Jaap van Zweden to conduct two weekends

For the first time, the Dallas Symphony Orchestra will perform all nine of Ludwig van Beethoven's symphonies in sequential order during the five-weekend long Beethoven Festival, beginning Oct. 18 and running through Dec. 2. Be swept away as the Dallas Symphony takes you on a journey through the composer's life as told through the profound, sometimes haunting symphonies that defined him.

Music Director Designate Jaap van Zweden will make his first appearances since being named as the new DSO music director last spring during two weekends of the festival. Van Zweden will lead the DSO in Beethoven's electrifying Fifth and the serene Sixth, Pastoral, followed by the composer's buoyant Seventh and witty Eighth Symphonies.

World-renowned conductors Gilbert Varga and Markus Stenz conduct the first two weeks, and maestro Jiří Bělohlávek leads the DSO and Dallas Symphony Chorus in the crowning masterpiece of Beethoven's symphonic work – the glorious Ninth Symphony.

## 30 Years Interviews and Outtakes

### Modern Art Museum of Fort Worth curator Auping introduces us to 34 influential artists

Michael Auping, curator for the Modern Art Museum of Fort Worth, has just released *30 Years Interviews and Outtakes*. *30 Years* is a collection of short interviews with 34 of some of the most prominent names in the art world.

The book features painters, sculptors, poets, musicians, architects and performance artists; Tadao Ando, Louise Bourgeois, John Chamberlain, Morton Fieldman, Ellsworth Kelly and Richard Tuttle to name just a few. Designed to be read as little snippets, these interviews are

the outtakes beyond the catalogue quotes.

Just like the catalogue can give life to the art, this book gives life to the artist. In certain interviews, you can sense the mood the artist is in, the personality they have in day-to-day life and what moves them.

This really is a book for artists and art lovers. Not a coffee table collection of color plates from the Modern's permanent collection but a glimpse into the lives of colorful people. An idea of how they live, how they work, what inspires them and what has brought them to the place they are now.

When you see a work of art you enjoy, it's always great to understand what they were thinking and the catalogue that goes with the exhibit can give you that. Most of these interviews stem from research for past catalogues. This collection goes beyond the what and gives you the who, why, when, where and how. The reader gets a glimpse into the artist rarely seen--where they come from, what caused this, how did you come to that, how they live, what they listen to, past careers etc.

With 30 years in the art world, Auping still has much more ahead of him. When asked recently during the *Tuesday Evenings at the Modern* lecture series who he still wants to interview, Auping answered without pause "Damien Hurst and Lucian Freud, (grandson of Sigmund Freud)."



## A Night at the Royal Albert Hall WRR's Kevin Sutton travels to England



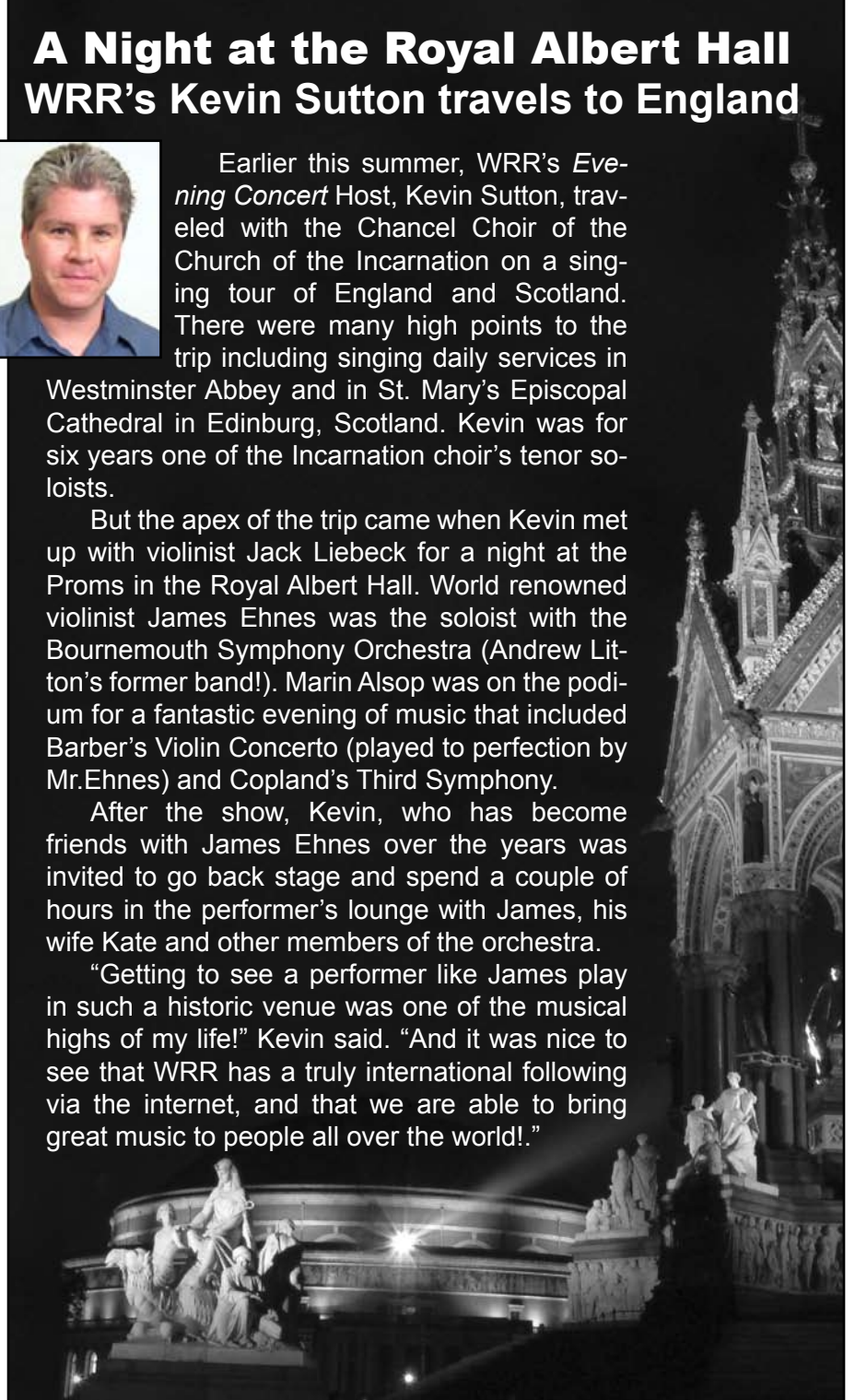

After the show, Kevin, who has become friends with James Ehnes over the years was invited to go back stage and spend a couple of hours in the performer's lounge with James, his wife Kate and other members of the orchestra.

"Getting to see a performer like James play in such a historic venue was one of the musical highs of my life!" Kevin said. "And it was nice to see that WRR has a truly international following via the internet, and that we are able to bring great music to people all over the world!"

## From the Ashes of Vesuvius continues at the DMA through Oct. 7



Many are aware that Mount Vesuvius' eruption in A.D. 79 buried the famous town of Pompeii, Italy. But, few people know that it also buried Stabiae, a seaside enclave of the rich and famous about three miles away, at the foot of the Sorrento-Amalfi Coast.

*From the Ashes of Vesuvius, In Stabiano: Exploring the Ancient Seaside Villas of the Roman Elite* will continue at The Dallas Museum of Art through Oct. 7 with a stunning collection of archaeological objects from the ancient Roman site of Stabiae (modern Castellammare di Stabia).

In Stabiano features maps, excavation photographs and 72 objects dating between 89 B.C. and the time of the eruption, all from the villas of ancient Stabiae.

## Survey says: WRR tops with citizens

Emanuel) to a court post in the small city of Bückeburg, a position he would retain for the rest of his life.

Unlike other members of his illustrious family, J.C.F. was not a revolutionary genius, nor did he ever achieve national or international stardom. His music is elegant and well constructed, and every now and again, as in the Cello sonata in A, we get clear glimpses of Sebastian Bach's influence on his son.

Although none of the works on this recording are particularly earth shattering, they are pleasant enough. It would seem however that they would be more rewarding to the players than the listeners. The stand-

Of Sebastian Bach's four composer sons, J.C.F. lived the least colorful life and achieved the least fame, spending the entirety of his career in one city, seemingly content with a normal domestic existence. While still a teenager, he was frequently occupied in the preparation of the weekly cantata presentations in his father's Leipzig church, a duty that became more burdensome as the elder Bach's health began to fail in the 1740s. By 1749 he had been appointed (most likely through the influence of his elder brother Carl Philipp

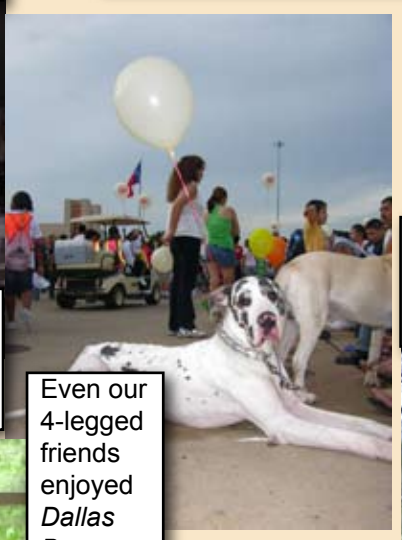

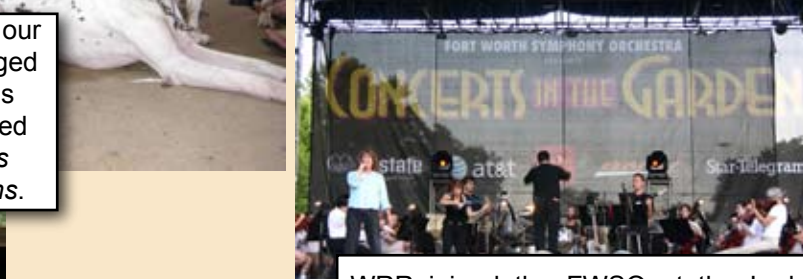

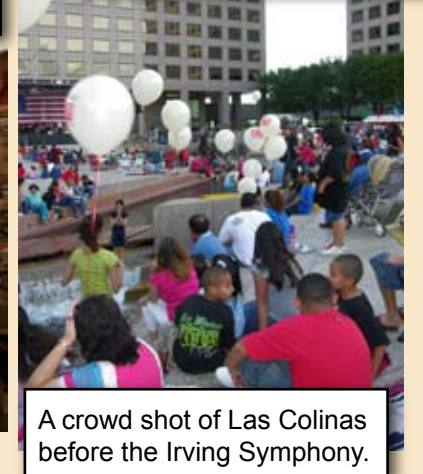

outs are the two cello sonatas which exhibit a rich harmonic language and a number of elegantly turned musical phrases.

For those unaccustomed to listening to the lighter more transparent tone of the fortepiano, the two trios may take some aural adjustment. Yet, one is quickly drawn to the clarity of the instrument's sound, especially in the nimble hands of Sabine Bauer.

CPO have spared us their typically long-winded and obtuse booklet essay in favor of the concise and informative note by Peter Wollny. As always with this label, the presentation is gorgeous and the sound quality is above reproach.

This is most certainly worth a listen and will be particularly appealing to fans of early chamber music. This music is a nice accompaniment for a good book and a glass of wine on a rainy night.
